

# Workshop One with Rachel Van Riel: *Putting Readers First* Tuesday March 17, 9.00am—noon

An introduction to the reader-centred approach in which libraries are moved from largely passive provision of books and computers to actively engaging their audience:

#### This workshop aims to:


- explore the principles and practice of reader development promoting books from the reader's point of view;
- demonstrate how an understanding of consumer psychology can help create successful library promotions;
- consider how a reader-centred approach can be used both inside and outside the library and online:
- outline a range of low-cost and easy-to-implement ideas which can be instantly put into practice to offer added value to library readers.

# Workshop Two with Rachel Van Riel: *Changing Libraries* Tuesday March 17, 1.00pm—4.00pm

This workshop will complement the changes within our libraries as a result of the implementation of the One Card, focusing on how our libraries are changing customer expectations and active relationships, priorities and day-to-day routines, requiring new skills for frontline staff especially where libraries have RFID or will be implementing it in the future. The session will deal with developing new practices and maintaining these practices complemented by a redesign of spaces.

#### This workshop aims to:

- share ideas for changing library environments to improve the experience for our customers
- understand how a customer-centred approach can change the organisation of the library and the management and presentation of collections
- earn about the psychological and physical factors which encourage people to pick up books and consider the implications for daily routines in the library
- consider how a customer-centred approach can change the role and daily tasks of library staff and what new skills are needed

## Background information on the Quarterly Meeting and workshop presenters: Corrine Hill: Executive Director, Chattanooga Public Library

She was named 2014 Librarian of the Year by Library Journal. This annual award recognizes one talented individual who is transforming their library, community and profession. Rebecca T. Miller, the editorial director for Library Journal, said Hill was chosen because of her transformation of The Public Library into a "vital hub of learning and experimentation."

"She did it first by connecting to Chattanooga as a place and responding to the city's ambitions as a tech centre," Miller said. "And she did it by pulling in great librarians and then setting them free to make magic. In the meantime, Hill has created a model for other librarians to watch, delivering great traditional services as she and her team test the cutting edge of library service."

#### Rachel Van Riel: Director Opening the Book Ltd, UK

Rachel has designed and installed 150 library interiors, working across all sizes and types of library buildings and with very different local communities. She has been a consultant to many library services across the UK, Ireland, Norway and Sweden.

Opening the Book has run national training programs, creating change agents with new skills and confidence, which reach every library service in the UK. Online training courses have been taken by 12,000 library staff in three continents, including an outstanding program to train 1000 staff in partnership with the State Library of Victoria.

Rachel has previously worked in Melbourne and Sydney; she is looking forward to her first visit to Western Australia and then South Australia, Brisbane and New Zealand.
